There are many forces in motion that bring change into our lives as educators and bring challenges into the lives of our returning veterans. General Bagby will discuss the changing world environment and its effect on veterans. As the former commandant of the Joint Forces Staff College, he will share his insight regarding the multiple changes facing the world of higher education and how these changes impact the lives of student veterans. He will also offer guidance regarding each College's ability to understand and respond to

student veteran's needs.

Byron Bagby is President and Co-Founder of BMB Solutions, LLC, an independent consulting firm providing business consulting in executive leadership development, strategy development, international business development, and alternative analysis. He spent 33 years in the U.S. Army, retiring at the rank of Major General. Byron's Army career included service as Commandant of Joint Forces Staff College, which conducts nine academic programs, one of which is accredited to confer a Master's Degree. He was Chief Operating Officer of the Office of Military Cooperation in Cairo, Egypt, managing the largest security cooperation program in the world. He has also served as Chief Operating Officer of U.S. Army, Europe, directing all of the activities of over 1,000 people in 30 locations. His duties include the Pentagon on the Joint Staff and Department of the Army Staff, and as Director of Operations of the NATO Joint Force Command. Byron earned his B.A. in Economics from Westminster College and his M.Ed. in Adult Education from UNC Chapel Hill.

Dr. Campos will provide a brief overview of Project MALES (**Mentoring to Achieve Latino Educational Success**), a multi-faceted research and mentoring initiative based within the Division of Diversity and Community Engagement (DDCE) at the University of Texas at Austin. Project MALES encompasses three interrelated initiatives: an ongoing research agenda focused on understanding the experiences of Latino males across the education pipeline; a mentoring program that aims to cultivate an engaged support network for males of color at UT-Austin and across the Central Texas community; and, a statewide P-16 Consortium focused on the success of male students of color.

Dr. Campos has over fifteen years of work experience managing projects that focused on providing low-income youth, first-generation students, and high school and college students of color with the skills and tools necessary for secondary and postsecondary success. In his most recent position as Project Director/Researcher in the Center for Community College Student Engagement at UT Austin, he led three national grant-funded research and practice-based initiatives that supported college and university administrators, faculty, staff, and students. He has extensive experience working directly on projects focused on male students of color, including a recent Kresge Foundation-funded research project and a prior direct-service project with the Institute for Community, University, and School Partnerships in the Division of Diversity and Community Engagement at UT. He has also taught at UT Austin, St. Edward's University and Austin Community College.

Dr. Campos received a doctorate degree in Cultural Studies in Education/Curriculum and Instruction from the University of Texas at Austin.

The Texas Success Center

Dr. Cynthia Ferrell



Increasing levels of postsecondary educational attainment among Texans has become an ever more salient imperative. Yet less than 40% of 25- to 34-year-old Texans have a certificate or degree. The Texas Success Center is leading the statewide effort fundamentally grounded in solving systemic educational problems impeding student success— incoherent and misaligned structures that result in far too few Texans prepared for meaningful careers. The Texas Pathway Project, based on the AACC model, is designed to support colleges’ redesign and realignment of programs, support services and advising, and instructional approaches to help students clarify their goals, choose and enter pathways that will achieve those goals, stay on those pathways, and master knowledge and skills that will

enable them to advance in the labor market and successfully pursue further education. Director of the project, Cynthia Ferrell, PhD, will share the framework and strategies supporting the implementation of guided pathways at scale statewide. Come to this keynote to learn how colleges are redesigning students' experiences and find specific opportunities for all Texas colleges to participate.

As the Executive Director of the Texas Success Center, Cynthia Ferrell leads the Center's mission of supporting the scaling of student success strategies and policies for the 50 Texas community college districts. For over 25 years, Cynthia has served the goal of promoting the success of underprepared and underrepresented students in practice, as college faculty, faculty advisor, Learning Center/Support Services Director and administrator; And then in support of statewide and national efforts to improve college practice and policy in her current role and formerly as the Director of Student Success Initiatives at the University of Texas at Austin, Developmental Education Policy Consultant to the Texas Association of Community Colleges, and Program Director at the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board. She earned her Ph.D. in higher educational administration from the Community College Leadership Program at The University of Texas at Austin.

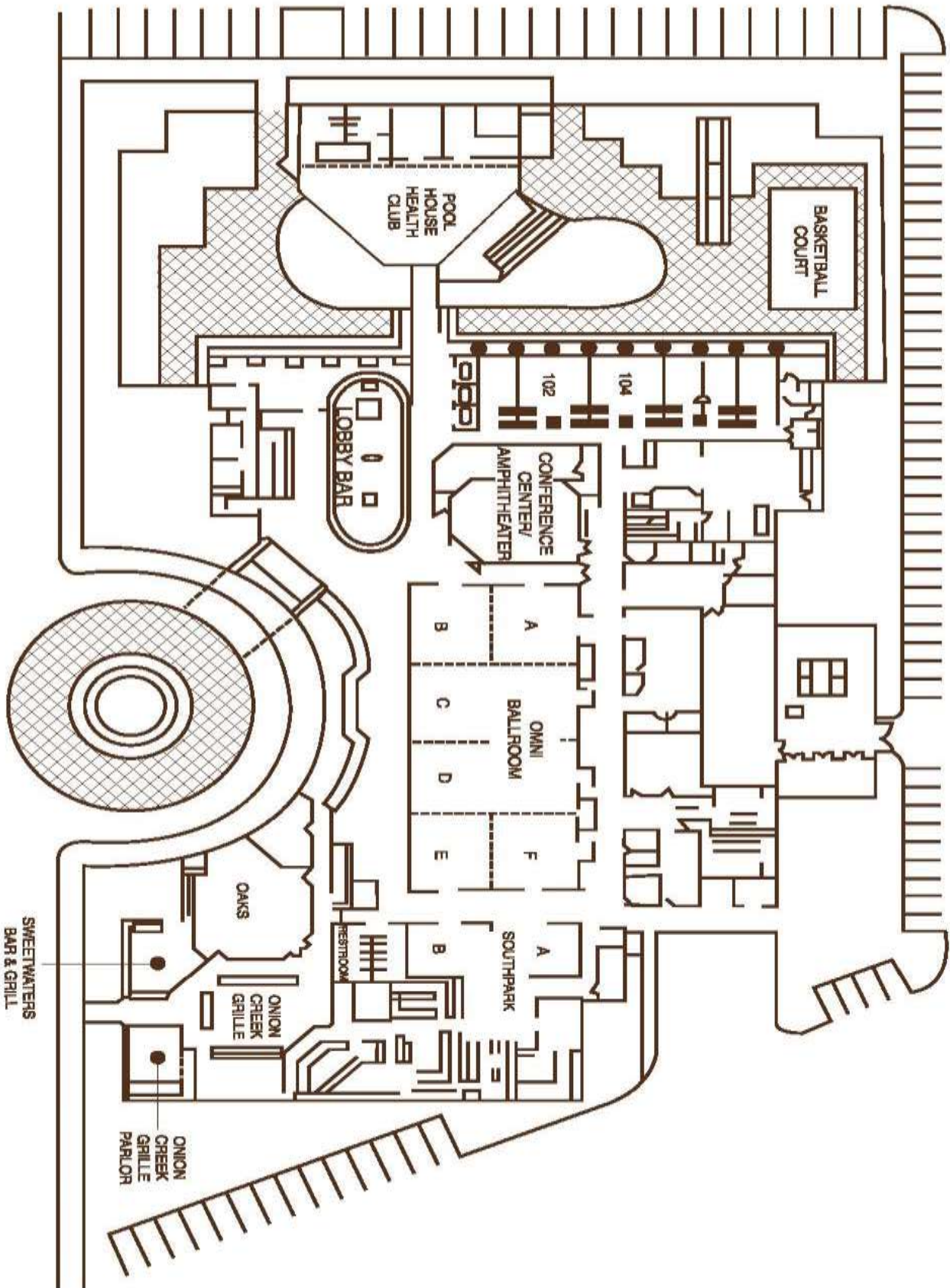
